Dear friends

This month will see the twentieth anniversary of my ordination as a minister at Canterbury Cathedral, and it's quite a sobering experience to realise how long I've been wearing a clerical collar for!

I remember, on a blazing hot day, walking into the Cathedral,

and towards the end of a very long service, kneeling on the ground, as the Archbishop put his hands on me, and said the prayer that made me a minister in the Church of God.

It's been quite a journey. It led me from Kent, to Oxford, back to Kent, to Northern Ireland, to Bedford and, most recently, here to East Harling. Very little of it has been easy, but it has all been the greatest privilege. And I can honestly say that I feel beyond blessed to have found my way to East Harling and the other nine parishes I serve.

Why am I sharing this with you? Because twenty years ago, I was reminded that I belong to Jesus Christ because I was baptised in the waters of grace. I have a specific role and calling as a Priest ... but that is not as important as my identity as a child of God, a brother of Jesus, loved and infinitely valuable in the heart of the Creator of all things.

Were you ever christened or baptised? Because if so, an eternal claim was made on your life, and, even if you don't fully realise it, you belong to God, who knows you, and loves you, and longs for you to know how precious you are. Or perhaps you have not been baptised ... the invitation is there for you to come home. God, the Father, the Son, the Holy Spirit – they are a dance of love, an orchestra of joy, and God and God's people are longing for you to receive the blessing of knowing that you belong with us, and are infinitely beloved.

Some day soon, I will go back to Canterbury, and kneel again in that place, and remember that I was called then, and am called now, and that calling has given me life, and joy and hope. God is calling you too, and the journey God calls you on is the journey home to meaning, fulfilment and deep, profound joy.

JUNE 2023 COMMUNITY NEWSLETTER UPDATE

May was once again very busy at the Practice, as illustrated by the following statistics for the month:

Number of appointments seen: 3,058

Number of incoming calls answered by Reception: 4,069

Number of appointments booked, but not attended: 223

The number of appointments not attended remains a concern, and we would again please ask that patients contact us if they are unable to attend an appointment so the appointment can be offered to another patient.

During May we launched a new managed repeat prescription service for patients who collect their medications from the Practice sites at East Harling and Kenninghall. When you come to collect your medication, you can leave your medication request for your next collection. All we ask is that you tick the items you will need in a month's time and your preferred collection point. We will inform you of the date of your next collection and we will do the rest. Your medication will be ready for collection on the date specified (not before).

Healthwatch Norfolk visited both Practice sites recently to seek patient feedback. Thank you to all our patients who provided their feedback for the report. We are in the process of reviewing the report in order to learn from it how we can continually further enhance the care we provide to our patients.

Our Patient Participation Group (PPG) continues to meet approximately every 6 weeks. New PPG members are always welcome. Please contact the Practice if you would like more information about our PPG and what membership of it involves. PPG meetings take place at our East Harling site, typically starting at 6.30pm and usually last approximately1 hour.

June sees 2 new Receptionists joining the Practice team following the recent recruitment of additional resource into our Dispensary team.

On Sunday 2 July we will have a stand at the village fete on the Poplars.


Our 11 July meeting will be an illustrated talk on the history of Fullers Mill which we visited earlier in the year.

TALES OF OLD HARLING, 277-16

'Harling's lost lanes and hidden highways'. By David Bailey.

1. Harling's first inhabitants and how they got here.

East Harling, Middle Harling and West Harling (The Harlings) first came into existence around 5,000 years ago. These three small stone-age communities came into being along the banks of the River Thet, around the edges of its shallow lake. For thousands of years before this their ancestors had been nomadic, existing by hunting the herds of giant deer, moose and reindeer that roamed across this corner of Breckland, where our homes are now. So, what suddenly happened to make Harling's first settlers swap the uncertainties and discomforts of hunting for a more comfortable way of life in riverside settlements along the River Thet? -----Farming!

The principles of farming, invented in central Europe, eventually arrived in this corner of Breckland around 5,000 years ago. For the first time in the history of mankind families could grow their own food and rear their own animals, which called for planning, permanent shelter and community co-operation.

And so it was that 'The Harlings' were born.

The first stone age farmers of the 'The Harlings' left no clues about what they actually called their three communities, but they did leave lots of evidence about their presence. Their farming implements. These artefacts of flint are occasionally found locally and include axes for clearing the land, arrow heads, scrapers for preparing animal skins for clothing, small sharp blades for inserting into bone handles to make scythes for harvest time and small flint pebbles called 'pot-boilers' (these were heated in a fire, dropped into crude clay pots or leather bags filled with water which instantly boiled and, hey presto, a delicious stew of cereal and meat. The effect of sudden heating followed by instant cooling left these flint pebbles with a unique crackled, dull patina and are commonly found on prehistoric settlement sites). See picture 1.



Now the question becomes, how did these revolutionary farming ideas reach this far flung corner of Breckland 5,000 years ago? Ideas that first created the villages we now call 'The Harlings'?

THE RIVERS!

These were the earliest of "Harling's hidden highways" and the reason why these 3 villages (and others in this locality) are where they are today. In the absence of any name, I would like to call this corner of Breckland, 'The Land Between The Rivers'!

Its hinterland was thick with impenetrable forest so its 3 rivers were the only way in, and the only way out. See picture 2.



The Waveney. Starts at Lopham fen and flows eastwards to the sea near Lowestoft/Yarmouth.

The Little Ouse: Also starts at Lopham fen, flowing westwards to the sea at The Wash.

The Thet. Starts around Hockham and Attleborough, joining The Ouse rivers at Thetford, then flows to the sea at The Wash.

As you will see from the map, The Harlings' were slap bang in the centre of the 'Land-between-the-Rivers' and so our earliest ancestral neighbours mastered the new techniques of farming a lot more quickly than we may think.

What happened next? Many generations later, another world-wide revolution occurred that was to change the lives of the stone age farmers in 'Theland-between-the-Rivers ----and once again, its principles arrived along its3 rivers. Life would never be the same again for The Harlings.

More next month. -- to include "Harling's ancient dead, its earliest road and its oldest house"!!!



GARDENNG NOTES

A short introduction to Fertilisers

Fertilisers often have the letters N:P:K followed by some numbers.

N = Nitrogen which promotes leaf growth. Particularly important for leafy vegetables

P= Phosphorous which promotes root growth

K = Potassium which helps flowers and fruit to form

The numbers give the relative amounts of each of these. E.g.

N:P:K 7:7:7 is a balanced fertiliser for general use.

When choosing a fertiliser at the garden centre think what you want it for. If you want to boost lawn growth you need a high nitrogen content. If you want a bumper crop of tomatoes, peppers etc. go for a high potassium one such as tomato feed. If you are planting shrubs and perennials go for a high phosphorus fertiliser such as bonemeal.

Fertilisers come in granular or liquid form. Granular or powder fertiliser is simple to apply and will only need one or two applications per year. Liquid fertilisers need diluting and are quick acting but short lived in their effect, so that several applications may be needed in a season. Fertilisers can only be absorbed by the roots if the soil or compost is moist.

Fertilisers can also be organic or inorganic (manmade chemicals). Organic are often slightly more expensive, but contribute to the health of your soil, whereas inorganic feed the plant only.

JULY IN THE GARDEN

Lawns: if you mow at all keep the blades high. If we have a prolonged hot dry spell like last year, you can either let nature take its course or water (if permitted). If you choose to water, you will have to keep it up until the rains come (remember most of us have metered water).

Cuttings: semi ripe cuttings (base of stems just turning brown) from shrubs. Cuttings from new season nonflowering growth of Mediterranean herbs (lavender, rosemary, sage and thyme).

Deadhead: Flowering shrubs and perennials including dahlias to promote further flowering.

Fruit: Trim summer fruits to shape. Blackcurrants can be pruned hard after picking fruit. Select a few new canes from summer fruiting raspberries and tie to wires for next year's fruit, cut the rest down to the ground.

Remove any diseased fruit and put in brown or green bin. Don't compost or you may spread the disease.

Vegetables: Start sowing for winter and spring. Sow spring cabbage, spring greens, and Florence fennel. If you have seed left plant a few French and Runner beans to grow up through the existing beans. If the weather is kind, you can extend the picking season up to late October.

Dig second early potatoes as you want them. Replant a couple of egg sized ones into large pots, keep topping up compost and keep frost free and they should be ready for Christmas dinner.

Netting: If you have bird netting tighten it up to prevent birds getting tangled up.

Relaxation: There should be several days when you can sit out and drink your morning coffee and your evening glass of wine. Remember why gardens are precious!

Murder Before Evensong, by Richard Coles

According to Amazon, a brand we know and use, nearly 8,500 people have reviewed the book. I felt a bit out of my depth when I read that. Gulp, here we go. I had great hopes. For me, it was a lightweight Agatha Christie, it started well with a good cast, but before you know it, it became rather farcical. If you like a light type of crime novel, go for it, but not for me. Keep Her Secret by Mark Edwards

It did fall over in the storyline halfway through, I felt, but even with that blip, I had to keep reading. I'm glad I did, as it had a twist at the end, I wasn't expecting at all. The Venice Secret: A dual-time story about the discovery of a hidden painting... by Anita Chapman



The second chapter is as follows: In 1780, the governess at Chipford Hall, Philippa, is offered the role of mistress by Earl Rupert. She escapes to Venice as a companion to bluestocking, Lady Cordelia, who reveals a secret that changes their lives. How is Philippa connected to Rachel?

There is lots of intrigue between the different worlds, and I love it. This book is the first novel by a new author, and she is researching her next one. I cannot wait to read the next one and hope you get the chance to read this one.
