Curates Corner

Dear Friends,

October is a month that brings mixed emotions for me. The start of September is a month that marks new beginnings: schools getting back into the full swing of things after a summer break, perhaps settling back into new rhythms at work, enjoying the last few days of warmth in the sun. Of course, November brings excitement, not least



for my Birthday – but preparing for Advent, Christmas arrives in the shops, and lists of presents start to be compiled and ordered. That leaves October. A month that is quite simply, normal. It is why October (and late September) is such a perfect time to celebrate the Harvest Festival. A time to look back, to think about all that has been this last year and to prepare ourselves to plunge back into the business of life as the festivities of Christmas loom.

The Harvest Festival is a traditional festival, recognized officially in the Church of England in 1862, to give thanks for the food which the agricultural harvest has bought in. Of course, it has developed from then into a festival celebrating provision and food more widely, often supporting local Foodbanks and other community organisations. At its core, the Harvest Festival marks the completion of hard work to get a crop rooted, grown, well-tended, harvested and prepared to feed the nation. It is a time, for a moment, to pause, rest, and give thanks.

In his ministry on earth, Jesus took this concept of pause, this need to reset quite seriously. Before he made major decisions such as choosing his twelve disciples, he went away, alone to a mountainside to pray. When John the Baptist was killed, in his mourning Jesus withdrew, alone to rest and grieve. As he prepared for his public ministry he spent 40 days in the wilderness, alone and in prayer and of course, hours before he was arrested, he took time away to pray and agonise over his fate to come. Jesus also took plenty of time to rejoice for what had been – regularly offering praise and thanksgiving to God for all that took place. One of the most regular times he offered his thanksgiving, was any time he sat down to eat, to share in food, giving thanks to God for its provision.

As we dwell on the Harvest that has been and look forward to the festivities of Christmas to come, let us stop and give thanks. Let us find the time to withdraw and bring our concerns to God, to pray for those in need. Perhaps as we give thanks for the food that is on our plates, we might extend our arms to those in need around us – offering them something to eat too. October can be a month of great blessings, if we simply pause, rejoice, and give thanks to God for his provision in our lives.

I will leave you with the opening words of Psalm 107, words that I have held onto as a reminder to give thanks for all that is around me: 'O give thanks to the Lord, for he is gracious, for his steadfast love endures for ever.' My prayer for each of us this harvest time, is that we would know the steadfast love of God and give him our thanks and praises for all he has provided.

- A journey ideal for shopping leaving the marketplace at 0946 every day. Goes to Diss on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, Goes to Attleborough on Thursdays and Thetford on Tuesdays, return back to the village at 1259 each day.
- An afternoon trip in to Attleborough leaves the marketplace at 1259, arrives in Attleborough at 1333, and returns at 1515.

THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER



Beer can be dangerous!!!

On 17 October 1914 at the Meux Brewery a 22foot-high wooden brewing tank of dark porter beer ruptured releasing the hot fermenting ale with such force that the back wall of the brewery collapsed. The force also blasted open several more vats of ale, adding to the flood. In all 320,000 gallons of beer rushed into the St Giles Rookery (a densely populated London slum area off the Tottenham Court Road in London). A 15foot-high wave of beer inundated 2 houses and took out the wall of the Tavistock arms killing the barmaid. In all 8 people died.

Gardening in October There will be rain, There will be wind, There will be dry spells, There may be a heatwave, There may be frost. It is Autumn in Norfolk after all.

Lawns: Rake up leaves and put on compost heap.

Raise the blades on your mower and cut if needed.

October is an ideal month for laying new turf. The ground is warm. You might need to water if we get a windy dry spell.

Shrubs and trees: A good month to plant container grown shrubs and trees for the same reason. Stake trees to prevent rocking.

<u>Cuttings</u>: take hardwood cuttings of shrubs, trees and non-grafted roses from the middle of the month. They can take up to a year to root enough to plant out.

<u>Plant:</u> Plant or move shrubs, trees and hedging. Keep watered if necessary.

<u>Prune</u>: buddleias by about half of their height to reduce wind damage.

Perennials: Leaving the seed heads will provide food for birds, especially finches.

Dahlias: Keep dead heading, water if necessary and check your supports

Annuals: <u>Hardy annuals</u> (e.g. sweet peas,) can still be sown in a greenhouse or cold frame. Prick out when large enough ready to plant out in March. Water sparingly, but don't let plants dry out. Ventilate the greenhouse as much as possible. If it gets really cold over winter cover with fleece, but don't leave on unnecessarily. The biggest killer in the winter is damp not cold.

<u>Tender annuals</u> can be removed as they get to the end of their lives (you can collect seed, lay out on absorbent kitchen paper and when dry keep in a labelled envelope to sow in the Spring).

Biennials such as foxgloves, forget-me-nots and wallflowers can be planted out so that they get a good start next year.

Bulbs: Try to finish planting Spring flowering bulbs by the end of the month. (Tulips can be put in tubs below other Spring flowering plants, otherwise leave until next month).

Fruit: Prune blackberries, tayberries and loganberries. Cut down the canes that have fruited and tie in the new growth

Vegetables: Cut down asparagus to ground level to prevent rocking in the wind. Keep clear of weeds.

<u>Plant</u> out Spring cabbages. Plant garlic and autumn onions. Sow broad beans such as Aquadulce or Meteor (can be sown direct in the ground or in pots to plant out later – watch for mice and crows, both of which adore bean seeds!

<u>Harvest</u> whatever is ready. Brussels sprouts, celery and parsnips were said to taste better after the first frost, however in recent years that would mean not harvesting them until after Christmas!

Pots and tubs: Clear out as soon as summer bedding is finished. If there is no permanent planting tip out onto the garden. If there are any pests or their eggs the birds will clean them up for you.

Clean the tubs and fill with a good quality compost (? the jury is still out?) and plant dwarf bulbs, pansies, violas, primroses etc.

If you are using plastic pots fill with a soil-based compost to prevent them blowing over in the wind.

Good drainage holes are particularly important in the Autumn and Winter as we often have prolonged wet periods.

If there is permanent planting remove any dead annuals and scrape away as much compost as possible. Feed and plant flowering perennials (violas, pansies, primroses all do well).

EAST HARLING& KENNINGTHALL MEDICAL PRACTICE

The Practice has remained extremely busy throughout the Summer, with some days seeing telephone call volumes closer to what would be expected during the Winter. The number of incoming telephone calls answered in August was 3,848. The number of total clinician appointments booked was 4,160, which was an increase of over 26% compared with July. Regrettably 155 of the appointments booked were not attended, and, as the Practice was not advised in advance, these appointments were lost.

The financial cost to the NHS of these lost appointments was approximately $\pounds 5,000$ in 1 month alone, and equates to approximately 6 full days of one clinician's appointments.

Patients receive a text message confirmation/reminder for all appointments booked, which now includes a link for the patient to cancel the appointment. Our website also offers patients a channel to cancel unwanted appointments – simply type "cancel" into the search bar of our website and complete the "Cancel an Appointment" form. This facility is available 24/7.

The Dispensaries at both sites have also been very busy, once again seeing a significant increase in the number of items dispensed in August. Please allow 5 working days for repeat prescriptions. Please also remember that Option 2 on the telephone is for repeat prescription requests. There will be little or no call waiting time on option 2. To save having to telephone your repeat prescription through, patients who collect their prescriptions at our East Harling and Kenninghall dispensaries can opt for a managed repeat prescription service – please ask at one of our dispensaries for more information.

We have completed further recruitment at the Practice over the Summer, with new staff joining the Practice Support Team, and new staff due to start in our Dispensary in September. We have also been extremely fortunate to have Joanna, Alex and Emma join the Practice Nursing Team. All 3 bring considerable experience and expertise to the Practice, and this recruitment brings a significant increase in the total number of nursing appointments we can now offer our patients.

As Winter approaches we enter another season of Covid-19 and flu immunisations. As was the case last year, the Practice will not be offering the Covid-19 immunisations at the Practice, but patients qualifying for Covid-19 vaccination will, during early-mid September, be able to book via the National Booking System, which will again include an option to book at The Healthy Living Centre in Thetford.

The Practice will be administering flu vaccinations to qualifying patients, initially on Saturday 4th and Saturday 11th October 2023 at our East Harling site. Qualifying patients will be receiving a text message inviting them to book directly into one of these clinics. Subsequently, patients will be able to book into these clinics via our Reception Team.
