Recently the Church celebrated the Feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary- and the Gospel reading for the day was Luke 1.46 -55, in which Mary sings of the glory of God, in a song that is traditionally called the Magnificat. 

Eco Church and St Francis

Many people will know St Francis as the birdbath saint. In garden centres you often see St Francis cast in concrete holding out his arms with birds on his shoulders and maybe some squirrels at his feet. And it is rather sad, if that is all we know about him. It's the same with St Christopher known mostly as a character on a necklace. But back to Francis.

The great chain of being was a way that early medievalists understood the world. Everything had its place with the Creator at the top served by angelic beings to humans, then animals, trees, plants and so on down to the



tiniest particle – all in strict hierarchical order. It was the way the world worked too – everyone knew their place.

Then in the early thirteenth century St Francis challenged that - he saw the universe as a place where all belonged together and all served each other. Francis would call all creatures, no matter how small, Brother or Sister because he knew they all shared the same beginning. Instead of words of power and lordship, he used the words kinship, sisterhood and brotherhood.

In one famous story, while walking along, St Francis saw a flock of birds and sat down and preached to them. Our Franciscan friend Clark while out running came across a troop of baboons, (this was not in England!)– he didn't preach to them directly rather ran for his life but when he got home he sat down and wrote a sermon to the baboons. 'You are the glory of God in your beauty, your aliveness, your baboonish ways, so be happy! My word to you now is Bless you!' As he said later, 'if I get another chance I've got my sermon ready'!

Pope Francis, in his Laudate Si, wrote about care for 'our common home'. He encouraged everyone to think about our relationship with the rest of the living world. Native American people call humans *the younger brothers and sisters* of Creation – who need to look to their older siblings (the natural world) to learn how to live in harmony. Francis called birds, fire and wind our brothers, and the moon, stars and water as sisters and the Earth, our Mother.

In this season, where we gather in the harvest and give thanks, it is also a good time to think about what we are giving and what we are taking. Are we taking too much? On his deathbed, St Francis famously said 'I have done what was mine to do, now go and find out what is yours' For the last 2 weeks the church has been filled with beautiful textile artworks made by people from around the world as a response to the question 'What do you love?' If you haven't been to see them – it is not too late – the exhibition closes on 7th October.

THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER



"The end of the summer is not the end of the world. Here's to October..." A.A.Milne

Lawns: cut with blades set high towards the end of the month then rake to remove thatch and to open up the base of the grasses to prevent fungal diseases from taking a hold.

The beginning of the month is ideal for sowing or laying a new lawn. The ground is warm, and we will have rain.

Trees and shrubs: a good month to plant container grown trees and shrubs for the same reason. Depending on the season bare root plants may be available towards the end of the month – these can be purchased and planted until early March. Stake new trees to prevent rocking – there will be wind ⊕

Cuttings: continue taking hardwood cuttings of shrubs, trees and shrub roses.

Plant: or move shrubs, trees and hedging. Keep watered until Mother Nature takes over, there will be dry spells.

Dahlias and Chrysanthemums: keep dead heading. Water if necessary and check your supports. Strong winds have become common in October.

Annuals: hardy annuals including sweet peas can still be sown in an unheated greenhouse or cold frame for the next couple of months ready to plant out in early Spring. Tender annuals can be removed as they get to the end of their life and replaced with bulbs, pansies, etc.

Biennials: such as wallflowers, foxgloves, hollyhocks and forget me nots can be planted out so that they get off to a good start next spring.

Bulbs: Try to finish planting spring flowering bulbs by the end of the month (tulips can be planted in tubs below other spring flowering plants, otherwise wait until November).

Vegetables: cut asparagus down to ground level to prevent rocking. Keep clear of weeds.

Plant out spring cabbage plants (protect from pigeons).

Harvest whatever is ready. Traditionally Brussels sprouts, celery and parsnips were harvested after the first frost, however in recent years this would mean you weren't eating them until after Christmas S, so harvest when you need them.


Pots and tubs: clear out as soon as summer bedding is finished. If there is no permanent planting tip them onto the garden – if there are any pest eggs they will be cleared up by the birds. Clean the tubs and fill with a good quality peat free soil-based compost (these fared least badly in my very unscientific trial). Good drain holes are particularly important in the winter as we often get prolonged periods of rain in the winter.

If there is permanent planting remove any dead annuals and perennials, feed and replant with pansies, violas and primulas.

Tip if you are not ready to clear out the tubs buy pansies etc in packs and pot them in 9cm pots to grow on and they can be transferred to the tubs later.

Remembering Bill Caley



Thomas William Caley, known to us all as Bill, was born at Shrub Farm Cottages Larling on the 3rd May 1931, the only child of Charles and Florence Caley. They moved to 2 Watton Road, Larling in 1934. He went to Larling School and Sunday school at St. Ethelbert's where his father was Churchwarden and also dug the graves, and his mother helped with the cleaning. From the age of 12 Bill helped his dad with the graves, so his involvement with the church started really early!

He started work aged 14 in the Maltings in Roudham (what used to be Aspect Roofing) where he worked until he was conscripted aged 18 and joined the Royal Signals and was drafted into the Military Police, stationed at Catterick. In late 1958 Bill attended a dance at the Gala Ballroom in Norwich where he met Angela, who had just finished her midwifery training and was due to go back to London; she never did. They married in Redenhall Church on the 18th June 1960. They had two children Lawrence born in April 1961 (a few days before electricity was switched on in Larling!), and Rebecca was born in April 1964.

Bill joined Anglia Water as Stores Manager and worked his way up to Superintendent of works by the time he retired in 1994. He worked at Anglian Water depots in Attleborough, Old Buckenham, and Thetford, finishing in Bury St Edmunds. In his later years with the Water Board he became an NVQ trainer and ran courses at Rutland Water where he would go for 3 days at a time. He loved these trips when he could share his wealth of knowledge and he continued these for a further 3 years following his retirement.

In recognition of his contribution to the water industry he was awarded an MBE in June 1994. There was much excitement as outfits were sought and arrangements made for our trip to London; it was a very proud day in the Caley household. His award was presented by the late Queen at Buckingham Palace. Bill also met the future king when the English Whisky company at Roudham was opened in 2006.

He was treasurer of Larling Church for 50 years, was a standard bearer and member of Great Hockham Branch of the Royal British Legion and for many years served on the Larling Parish Council. He was also a member of the Oddfellows.

Being a child during the 2nd WW the philosophy of make do and mend stayed with him all his life but he would prefer to describe it as innovate and improvise! He had a habit of collecting and accumulating anything and everything and often items originally built for one purpose would regularly be adapted and put to use in other ways. Fishing rods became implements for picking apples, television aerials became garden hoes, and Larling's first wind turbine was built from a 1949 Raleigh bicycle and some Perspex he salvaged, along with many other such inventions too numerous to mention here.

As has been referenced Larling and the Church were particularly close to Bill's heart. Being a village of only around 100 inhabitants Larling very rarely appears in the printed word however there is one publication in which the village is mentioned every month. He was so proud of this fact he had amassed over 20 years' worth of the Church Contact Magazine, this is thought to be largest collection in the area!

During retirement there was an increased focus on vegetable production. Bill loved his garden but he did not love rabbits so it was necessary to have an effective rabbit control policy. Travelers through the village at 4 or 5 a.m.in the morning may have been alarmed at the sound of gunfire but this was just the Larling SAS (Special Air gun Service) engaging with the enemy attempting to cross the Northern border of the meadow behind the house. Bill could be spotted hanging out of the window lining up rabbits with his telescopic sights at a range of up to 50 yds. Rabbits retreating to the south would be met by General Harold Bacon who was responsible for preventing breaches across the southern border. Ground assaults were regularly launched and sheep scattered in all directions as the ride on lawnmower (with air gun) spearheaded attacks to dispatch more of these fluffy tailed terrorists.

Bill and Angela celebrated 64 happy years together in June of this year with smoked salmon sandwiches and champagne smuggled into the Norfolk & Norwich during the early days of his illness. As a family we all loved and respected our father immensely and he in turn was very proud of us and the grandchildren. He was very kind and caring and supported us all throughout our lives, always helping us out and providing advice when asked. On his journey through life he made many friends and we will all miss him hugely but are very grateful for the long and happy life he enjoyed.

ROSEMARY & THYME FARINATA

Gluten Free - Italian farinata, also known as Socca in France lands somewhere between a flat bread and crepes - great as a Snack with drinks or as one of a selection of canapes.

<u>Ingredients</u> 180g chickpea flour (gram flour)

450 ml water at room temperature 2tsp Fennel seeds 1 tbsp chopped rosemary 1.5 tbsp fresh Thyme 74ml Olive oil

Farinata is best started the day before you want it.

Method

Place the chickpea flour in a bowl whisk in the 450ml of room temperature water, make sure there are no lumps of flour left. Cover and leave for 24 hours - if you are in a hurry this stage can be reduced to 4 hours.

After the resting then preheat the oven to 220 C fan, and grease and line a Swiss roll tin but only the base as you want crispy edges.

Pour the 75ml of olive oil into the tin and swirl around.

Add a ½ tsp salt to your batter and whisk again as the batter may have separated, pour the batter into the tin and with a fork whisk and froth to incorporate the oil and batter together.

Sprinkle over the fennel seeds and herbs.

Gently transfer to the oven and bake for 25-30 minutes rotating the tin halfway through until golden around the edges and cooked through the centre.

Set aside to cool for 5 minutes then then run a knife around the edges of the farinata to release it and transfer carefully to a board and cut into bite size pieces. Farinata is great served with a chilli jam or a good onion chutney. Enjoy!


The CONTACT Team need willing volunteers to help with the printing of the magazine using the printer in the church to print the 1,500 plus copies each month.
