

Dear Friends,

Earlier in the summer I spent some time in the Burgundy region of France living amongst the Christian community of Taizé. As part of a county-wide pilgrimage a small group of us took 31 young adults from across Norfolk to join the community for the week, living and working together.



Taizé is a community formed of Christians from all denominations and nationalities, who gather to study, pray and spend time in silence together. As you might imagine, it was rather a strange place to watch the Euros final, shoulder to shoulder with Spanish supporters and English alike. One of the main principles of the community is slowing down, taking time to appreciate the world around us and time in silence to reflect upon life and faith. Each morning there is a Bible reflection, the theme this year - what does it mean to listen? How do we listen to our communities well? How do we journey together with people who are 'different' to us?

One of the beautiful things about Taizé is the diversity of people there, yet there is the ability to get along. It is an interesting reflection of life in England and in our corner of Norfolk. We are full of beautiful diversity, people with many different heritages, characteristics, lifestyles, hopes and dreams - yet the lesson Taizé teaches us all is that we have far more in common than separates us. This is of course a pertinent reflection amidst the last few weeks of unrest in towns and cities up and down the country.



## **Remembering Valerie Ann Dangerfield**



Valerie was born in Twickenham, Middlesex, on 12<sup>th</sup> July 1943. She was the only child of George and Hilda Cole. It was through her best friend, Terry, that she met Anthony Dangerfield who was to become her husband. He proposed to Valerie following a job offer to work in New Zealand. After their wedding, in London, they set off on a 'slow boat' to New Zealand where they lived in Dunedin for two years, followed by six months in Blenheim. But Dunedin was the place they loved best and they returned there. They enjoyed life and the adventure of exploring the countryside on their Triumph motorbike. In 1969 they welcomed their first child,

Katherine followed by their son Stuart in 1972. The family returned to London in 1977 and after three months travelling round Europe in a campervan found a house here in Norfolk – in Bridgham. The family later moved to White Hart Street in Harling. Val worked in Thetford and then at the John Innes Institute as a PA to many of the research scientists and senior researchers and visiting professors from around the world. She once remarked that trying to organize conferences or travelling arrangements for them was like herding a bunch of cats! Both children attended primary school then in the Old School Hall on School Lane and brought many of their school friends home with them. As a result she became more of a mother to a large number of their friends which continued to the end of her life.

Along with her father, George, Valerie became a much loved and valued member of the Church Family here at St. Peter's & St. Paul's. Her secretarial skills were instrumental when she became Secretary of the PCC. She supported the then Rector Revd Nigel Kinsella and the PCC for many years. She was also an active member of the "Events Team" memorably cooking a "Roast Beef of Old England" dinner for St George's Day alongside her team mates Judy Walls, Sue Dolling and Caryll Brown (as she was then) and helping to organize the 2008 Wedding Festival in the Church. She was particularly pleased with the key role she played in getting the Floodlighting of the Church installed and setting up the Floodlighting Requests for people to have the church lit on special days of celebration or in memory of loved ones.

Valerie was also a great supporter of many animal charities including the Owl Trust and was very fond of her family of Cavalier King Charles Spaniels, the original Bailey, followed by Max and Leo. In 2004, when Katherine and Paul were married, Valerie was thrilled to gain two granddaughters, Elizabeth and Sarah, whom she cherished. She was very proud of them both and always took great pleasure in all their achievements. She was a very proud Grandma at Elizabeth's wedding to Lee just a few weeks ago.

All the people at the funeral, childhood friends, work colleagues, church friends, village friends, neighbours & exneighbours – those of us who have known her for a long time and those of us for just a short time – dog walkers, cake makers ..... ALL of us have appreciated and come to love that special 'something' that made Valerie the wonderful lady, the precious treasure, she was.

## THE GARDEN IN SEPTEMBER

Harvest Harvest Harvest! This is where the harvesting of all your produce steps up a notch.

**Lawns:** Grass has done extremely well this year. This is a good month to repair damage to lawns or to plant complete new ones from seed when the ground is still warm and moist, and the temperatures are unlikely to reach extremes in either direction. Keep new grass moist and give a cut towards the end of October with the blades of the mower set high.

**Pruning:** Prune buddleia hard when it finishes flowering.

Hedges: Give evergreen hedges a final light trim.

**Cuttings:** Take semi hard cuttings of evergreen shrubs and trees and shrub roses.

**Plant:** Plant or move evergreen shrubs, trees and hedging later in the month. Keep watered if necessary.

**Perennials:** Keep dead headed (unless you are leaving seeds for the birds) and cut down any dead stems.

**Dahlias:** Keep dead headed. Water if necessary and check your supports – we can get some strong winds in September.

**Hardy Annuals:** Sow in a cold frame or greenhouse over the next couple of months ready to plant out in March. Prick out when large enough to handle.

**Biennials:** such as foxglove, hollyhock and forget me nots can be planted out so that they get a good start next year.

**Bulbs:** Plan daffodils. Pot up daffodil and hyacinth bulbs for indoor flowering.

**Strawberries:** A good time to increase strawberry stock, put pots of compost next to your plants and peg down one runner into each. These will root quite quickly, then cut off runner and pot on.

**Vegetables:** You can still sow radishes and winter spinach. Plant out spring cabbage plants to towards the end of the month. Keep tomatoes and chillies well watered. Harvest what is ready

**Pots and tubs:** Keep well watered. Plant some bulbs in small pots which can then be planted on into tubs when you remove the summer bedding. **Daffodils and Tulips can be planted remarkably** deep in a tub leaving plenty of space at the tops for planting for Spring flowering colour, (bellis, pansies and primulas all do well). It is too early to plant Tulips in the ground. **Wildlife:** Some birds use nest boxes to roost over winter. Take them down and rinse out with hot water. Allow to dry out before putting back up. Line with dry grass or straw to make them warmer for small birds. Leave some seed heads in place to provide an energy rich food source.

Leave fallen apples for the birds – if it is a cold winter, you may even get some winter migrants.

Your decorations do not have to be standard tree decorations, though we welcome those too. We have been delighted with the imaginative and inventive ideas on show in the previous festivals.

We are setting ourselves a target this year of 100 trees and are also hoping to get the local press and television involved, so we really need your help to achieve this. Please spread the word!


