Dear Harling & Guiltcross Benefice,

It is with great joy I write to you, for the first time, to introduce my family and I ahead of our arrival next July when, God willing, I will be ordained at Norwich Cathedral to serve my curacy with you.

My name is Josh, and together with my wife, Beth, and our 18 month old daughter, Eden, we are looking forward to getting to know you all over the next few years as my training as an ordained minister continues. I am currently training contextually, so spending a few days a week

However, it was as I looked deeper that I saw so many signs of life; a well-loved votive stand at Garboldisham with candles burning, music lists filled with choral mass settings and hymns at East Harling, rota's attached to notice boards with readers, flower arrangers and intercessors, advertisements for bell ringing practice and even the wonderful smell of fresh summer flowers. Each church I visited showed life in abundance. Each church I visited captured the very essence of a living faith.



EAST HARLING & KENNINGHALL MEDICAL PRACTICE - Practice update: October 2022

Thank you to everyone who has provided feedback in respect of our first newsletter contribution in September.

The Practice has had another very busy few weeks, which has included 2 Saturday flu clinics where approximately 1,000 patients have received their flu vaccinations. Our next scheduled Saturday morning flu clinic is on Saturday 5th November at East Harling. Appointments for this clinic can be requested via our website, telephoning the Practice, or asking at the Reception desks at either East Harling or Kenninghall.

During September we have welcomed Dr Paul Cronin and Dr Ian Jennings to the Practice, who are providing maternity cover for one of our GPs. Dr Carsten Soborg is also providing additional GP support. In addition we are in the process of recruiting additional non-clinical staff to support the continuing growth in patient demand, and have this month increased resource levels in our Dispensary.

The number of patients not attending a scheduled appointment reduced from 120 appointments in August, but there were still unfortunately 80 appointments lost in September, so I would repeat my plea to patients to please let us know as soon as they know that they cannot attend an appointment (whether this is a face to face or telephone appointment) in order that we can offer their appointment to another patient.

As I mentioned in the previous newsletter, I am very keen to gather as much patient feedback as possible so that we can continually strive to improve patient experience. Thank you to the 120 patients who have completed Patient Feedback forms over the past 4-5 weeks. These forms are available at both Practice sites and on our website. I do read every one of these forms, specifically looking to address any concerns raised by patients and pass on positive feedback to staff highlighted by our patients.

Healthwatch Norfolk recently visited our East Harling site to speak to patients visiting on that day and we will be reviewing and actioning their report when we receive it in conjunction with our Patient Participation Group which is in the process of being relaunched.

We have received some feedback about difficulties with our telephone system during busy periods. This is being reviewed to increase line capacity, but in the meantime, I would appeal for our patients' support in not dialling both telephone numbers simultaneously from 2 telephones, for example, from a mobile and a landline, because all calls to both numbers are automatically routed

into 1 queue for our combined Reception team to answer.

If I could please also request that patients utilising the car park at the rear of our East Harling site do not drive on to the driveway of the residential property beyond the car park as this driveway does not belong to the Practice.

THE GARDEN IN NOVEMBER

Borders: A good time to dig out new beds and borders. Weed several times before panting new shrubs, trees and perennials.

Deciduous shrubs, trees and hedges: From mid-November to early March is the ideal time for planting bare root woody plants. Dig the area to be planted and add well-rotted manure - these are long term plantings. Good nurseries and garden centres will be able to supply them. Peter Beales at Attleborough normally digs roses to order. My beech hedge at the front of the house and my tapestry hedge at the back came mail order from Glebe Farm Hedging at Langham on the Suffolk-Essex border. Before planting soak the roots for no more than 30 minutes. You should be able to see the level they were in the soil, and aim to plant at the same depth. Dig the hole about twice as wide as the root spread. Cover the roots in layers, shaking the plant gently to get the soil to settle around them. Firm in with your foot. Trees will need staking. If we have strong winds check them occasionally and re-firm the soil around them. If you can't plant them straight away dig a narrow trench and heel them in.

Lawns: The most asked about plant this year is grass. By now you will have a pretty good idea how your lawn has fared during the drought. Walking around the village some lawns have recovered more or less fully, others have a few bald patches, and some are almost completely dead, so where to go from here? If you are one of the lucky ones with a more or less ok lawn then just follow your normal autumn routine. Rake dead leaves up regularly so that your grass can breathe and see the sun. Mow with the blades set high when the grass is dry. Leave for a couple of days then aerate by making holes with a fork (you can hire power tools for this if you have a large lawn) and rake over a top dressing applied at the rate of about a shovel full per sq. metre, finishing with the back of a rake until it has more or less disappeared. You can buy readymade dressing or make your own from 3 parts sandy soil, 6 parts sharp sand and one part multipurpose compost or leaf mould. This process encourages better root growth and makes your lawn more resilient to drought and waterlogging.

If you have small bare patches, treat as above then rake out the bigger gaps to a few cms deep and fill with some of the dressing mix. You can sprinkle a small amount of seed and rake to cover by about 5 mm, and you will probably still get reasonable germination, if not then you can re-sow these patches in Spring.

If your lawn is beyond help you can remove the grass and prepare a new lawn. (might be a good opportunity to rethink the layout of your garden). It is not too late to lay turf, but don't lay if the ground is waterlogged or frozen. Keep the new lawn free from build-up of leaves. Water if necessary. If you prefer the cheaper option of seed start to prepare the ground on sunny days during November through to about February (there is no hurry). Remove the dead grass and dig over the area to be grassed. Dig in leaf mould or compost and rake the soil. Flatten with a roller or by standing on boards and rake again. The aim is to provide sufficient depth of reasonable soil for the roots, which can easily go down 20 cm. As with laying turf don't dig frozen soil that will slow down warming up in the Spring. In late March or early April (depending on the weather) flatten again, rake and sow a good quality seed, raking in gently to hide some from the birds. The coarser utility grasses fared better this summer, but who knows what next year will bring. There are also mixes that include wild flowers available if you want to do your bit for nature.

Seeds: There will be a few days when even the hardiest amongst us prefer to stay inside. That is a good time to browse the seed catalogues (either hard copy or on the internet). Be wary of listings on eBay and if tempted check that they are UK seeds – many of the diseases affecting well known plants and trees have come in from abroad -Dutch Elm disease, Ash die-back, Horse Chestnut canker to name but a few. If using a paper catalogue draw a ring around the seeds you would particularly like to try - you never know Father Christmas may see them!

The Good Servant by Fern Britton This was the first time I had read Fern Britton's books. I know she is now a prolific author. I only knew of her in her broadcasting days and the fact she lives in a beautiful part of the West Country, a place close to my heart. I had the chance to read this book whilst having a cold recently. It was perfect for not being disturbed and sitting by a lovely warm fire. The Hundred-Year-Old Man who climbed out of the Window and Disappeared by Jonas Jonasson

I was intrigued by the title, so I recently purchased it at a charity shop. It was first published in Sweden in 2009 and has since been translated into English. I think that is where my challenge with this book lies. I had hoped it would be a good read, but the sentences' structure didn't fit together. Having seen it was translated from Swedish, it all makes sense.

The story is an understandable one. I think of someone in a nursing/residential home not wanting to celebrate their birthday, particularly their 100'th birthday. And so he escapes out of the window, not something most people of that age would think of doing, I am sure. The book started well but lost its way about halfway through as reading the poorly constructed sentences just got to me in the end, and I gave up. It was not something I usually do, but it was fast becoming a book I didn't want to pursue. However, it may be right up your street, so why not try?

Artemis by Andy Weir

Artemis is another excellent sci-fi book but not as exciting to read as The Martian. 





Scam messages and how to report them (thanks to Which magazine Ed.)

Scammers are looking to steal your details by sending fake text messages claiming to be from the retailer Amazon. These phoney texts tell you to follow a link to secure your account following an attempted login. They are examples of phishing texts, which are designed to steal your personal data in order to scam you either now or in the future.



There has also recently been fraudulent texts from scammers impersonating the government to offer non-existent discounts on energy bills. Hopefully you are aware you do not need to apply for the discount it is automatically applied to your energy bill. There are other scammers sending text messages purporting to come from your son or daughter saying they have lost their phone and asking them to use a false number to contact them. Once parents are convinced they are talking to their son or daughter via text they then get asked for help and to send them money which of course they then lose.

Recently, Amazon has repeatedly been targeted by scammers looking to catch out unsuspecting customers. Many people have take to Facebook to warn others about these scams, and searches for 'Amazon login scam text' have surged on Google.

Another scam text example reads: Amazon: We detected a login into your account from a new device on 17/10/2022 at 15:10:08 UTC. If this wasn't you, you can terminate that session via: [https://checkupamazon.com].'

<u>Report internet scams and phishing</u> - Please take the time to report misleading websites, emails, phone numbers, phone calls or text messages you think may be suspicious.

Please be aware that you should not give out private information (such as bank details or passwords), reply to text messages, download attachments or click on any links in emails if you're not sure they're genuine.

However, these scammers are getting more and more sophisticated, making their messages look like the genuine article, it is really difficult to be sure whether they are genuine or not—so if in doubt—check it out! Indeed if you think it might be a scam report it.

Suspicious emails- Forward the email to report@phishing.gov.uk. The National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) will investigate it. When you forward the message you get an automated reply which states:

As of 30/9/2022 the number of reports received stands at more than 14,400,000 with the removal of more than 100,000 scams across 184,000 URLs. We are unable to inform you of the outcome of our review, but we can confirm that we do act upon every message received. We will analyse the content of the email you have sent to us and any websites it links to. If we discover activity that we believe to be malicious, we may:seek to block the address the email came from, so it can no longer send emails; work with website hosting companies to remove links to malicious websites; raise awareness of commonly reported suspicious emails and methods used with the help of our partners.

Text messages - Forward the text message to 7726 - it's free. This will report the message to your mobile phone provider.
