


SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Beginning October 5th at 7pm in St Peter and St Paul's, East Harling. Occurring weekly, for an hour.



Dear friends

As I write this, we are all still in the aftermath of the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Obviously everyone has their own relationship to this event but I think that it is uncontroversial to say that this is a pivot point in the history of our Nation, and of the Commonwealth of Nations.

Just under seventy years ago, quite some few months into her reign, Her Majesty went to Westminster Abbey for her Coronation. A young woman, she went into that imposing building, and layer upon layer of glory and splendour were laid on her. Robes, cloth of gold, jewels, sword, holy oil, orb, sceptre, crown ... all these layers of majesty, of estate, of beauty, of value laid upon her as she became Queen of the United Kingdom, Head of the Commonwealth, Supreme Governor of the Church of England and so on and so on ...

Now as her body is prepared to be buried, all those layers are stripped away, and the final truth of her physical body is about to continue on. For like every one of us, Elizabeth II is dust, and to dust she shall return.

But she also knew the deeper truth, the deeper glory, that all that glory was always transient ... and that an eternal glory is hers in the presence of God. She knew in life that everything that was laid on her, on that Coronation Day, and on every day since all the splendour, all the power, all the expectations, all the pomp and ceremony, and even all the wealth, was just a dim reflection of the glory and majesty of life with God in eternity.

On the Tuesday before she died, we all saw a photo of Her Majesty upon the handover between Prime Ministers, and I think we all suspected that there might not be much time left to her. But there was also a joy and a vitality that still shone out of her, even when her body was clearly weakened. She bore that diminishing so well because of her confidence that an even greater glory awaited her.

You and I live lives very different from hers, or from our new King's; but you and I have an invitation, a call from God to make our home with him, where all shall be love and joy and light. I pray that in these days when we realise that truly nothing earthly will last forever, you would consider what God might have in store for you – life, love, a home that lasts forever, and confidence and hope in this life.

EAST HARLING & KENNINGHALL MEDICAL PRACTICE - Practice update: October 2022

Firstly, I would like to introduce myself as the new Practice Manager. I am very much looking forward to working to support all our patients, and hearing from them in respect of how we can continually strive to provide them with the highest possible level of care.

In order to hear as many views from patients as possible, we have now launched a new patient feedback form which is available either in paper form at East Harling and Kenninghall practice sites, or on our website.

We are also re-launching our Patient Participation Group (PPG) which is now seeking volunteers willing to attend regular meetings (approximately every 6 weeks), again to discuss how our patients think the Practice is performing and encourage views on how we can further enhance the care we provide. If you are interested in joining the relaunched PPG please contact me via my e mail address: <u>s.round3@nhs.net</u> I thought it may be useful for this first newsletter article to outline the size and scope of the Practice as well as the latest updates on flu and Covid-19 vaccinations:

- The Practice currently has approximately 8,700 patients and has a catchment area of 140 square miles
- The range of care provided by the Practice is considerable, and includes:
 - o 8 highly experienced doctors
 - Nursing staff, again all highly experienced, led by our Practice Nursing Manager whose team also includes a further nurse, Advanced Nurse Practitioner, and an Emergency Care Practitioner and 2 Health Care Assistants
 - Mental Health Practitioners
 - A community pharmacist
 - A Midwife
 - First Contact Physiotherapists
 - A Social Prescriber
- In addition, we have periodic specific clinics, including flu vaccinations and diabetic eye screening.
- The next round of flu clinics for patients eligible for the flu jab will be taking place on the mornings of Saturday 1st and 8th October 2022. Appointments for these clinics can be booked by telephoning the Practice on 01953 717204, or by visiting Reception at either Practice site.
- From 7 September 2022 eligible patients will start to be invited for an Autumn Covid-19 booster. As patients become eligible for the booster they can book via the National Booking Service online at :

Patients who are housebound or who are resident in a care home will be subject to separate arrangements

NO COVID-19 VACCINATIONS WILL BE UNDERTAKEN AT EITHER PRACTICE SITE

- We operate dispensaries at both practice sites which almost mirror the Practice opening times of 08:30-18:00 Monday-Friday, with the exception being that the dispensaries are closed 13:00-14:00 each weekday.
- Patients can telephone during our surgery hours (08:30-18:00 Monday-Friday) and speak to one of our Reception staff (we do not use a call centre, so the call will be answered by one of our team at East Harling or Kenninghall)
- Our Reception team are not targeted with the number of calls answered in a particular time period, as instead our focus is on giving each patient the maximum amount of time and attention. This can sometimes lead to patients holding on the telephone lines, especially during busy periods.
- Patients can also use the electronic forms on our website for a range of services, including requesting repeat prescriptions

To give an idea of the demand on the Practice, which continues to grow weekly, for the 5 days of week commencing 15th August (2022), the clinicians across both Practice sites completed 691 patient appointments.

Regrettably, during the month of August (2022) there were approximately 120 appointments where the patient did not attend their booked appointment. We would please ask that if you are ever not able to attend an appointment you let us know as soon as possible in order that the appointment can be offered to another patient.

The entire team here is totally committed to providing the best possible care for all our patients. I do believe that listening to feedback from our patients is critical to our constantly striving to further enhance patient experience, and I look forward to speaking to as many of our patients as possible over the coming months.

THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER

Lawns: I would leave alone until towards the end of the month then rake. May need a cut with the blade set high if we have substantial rain (????). This is the ideal month for laying a new lawn with turf. The ground is warm and there will be rain(????)

Trees and shrubs: a good month to plant container grown trees and shrubs for the same reason. Depending on the weather bare root plants may be available towards the end of the month – these can be purchased and planted up until early March. Stake trees to prevent rocking – there will be wind.

Don't give up on trees and shrubs that look dead after the drought they may come back in the spring. Equally don't be surprised if some of those that you thought had got away with it curl up their toes and don't survive the winter. It would be worth buying a few small shrubs in pots and growing them on to fill gaps in the Spring. Remember if all else fails the gardening club have an excellent plant sale in May.

Cuttings: Take hardwood cuttings of shrubs and trees, and shrub roses from the middle of the month.

Plant: Plant or move shrubs, trees and hedging. Keep watered if necessary until Mother Nature takes over – there will be dry spells.

Dahlias: Keep dead headed. Water if necessary and check your supports – the hurricane of 1987 was in October.

Annuals: Hardy annuals can still be sown in a greenhouse or cold frame over the next couple of months ready to plant out from March. Prick out when large enough to handle.

Tender annuals can be removed as they come to the end of their life cycle and replaced with bulbs, pansies forget me nots and primulas

Biennials nniels: such as foxglove, hollyhock and forget me nots can be planted out so that they get a good start next year

Bulbs: Try to finish planting spring flowering bulbs by the end of the month (tulips can be put in tubs below other spring flowering plants, otherwise wait until November).

Vegetables: Cut down asparagus to near the ground to prevent rocking in the wind. Keep clear of weeds. Plant out spring cabbage plants.

Harvest whatever is ready. Traditionally Brussels sprouts, celery and parsnips were not harvested from the garden until after after the first frost, however in recent years this would mean you wouldn't be eating them until after Christmas! So harvest as you need them.

Pots and Tubs

Clear out as soon as the summer bedding is finished. If there is no permanent planting tip them out onto the garden – if there are any pest eggs they will gratefully received by the blackbirds, but if put in the compost heap may come back to haunt you in the spring. Clean the tubs and fill with a good quality compost (If using plastic tubs a soil based compost will give it more weight and prevent being blown over in the wind) Good drain holes are particularly important in the winter as we often have prolonged wet periods.

If there is permanent planting remove any dead annuals, feed and plant winter/spring flowering annuals and perennials (primroses, pansies and violas all do well). Good Gardening

Book review – Contact magazine – October 2022

Here is a review of a selection of books available from the Book Swap in East Harling or your local bookshop. With all this recent hot weather, the best option is to find a chair and start a good book.

The last thing he told me by Laura Dove

There are great reviews of the book on the cover. You, therefore, think it's a great read. It is an interesting read for sure for several reasons.

Initially published in 2021 in the US, stated as being the No 1 New York Times bestseller. Having read the book, I find this a rather worrying comment.

It has a good plot that hooks you in, but really that's where the attraction stops. There is much looking backwards i.e.., two years ago, i.e.., two months ago. Personally, I am not a fan of this kind of narrative, but it may work for you. It has a murder/mystery element to it, and as the reader, you expect great things. Don't hold your breath

Spilling the Beans by Clarissa Dickson Wright

This book has been described as the autobiography of the year, published in 2008. I loved it, and it made me laugh and cry throughout it. She is better known as one of the "two fat ladies" on television. My gosh, what a life she has led. It is an honestly written book with nothing left out. How she has managed to survive her upbringing and life is incredible. It is, as one review says, brutally candid. Don't let that put you off at all. If you feel you are having a bad time, read this book, it will cheer you up to no end.

The Alchemist by Paulo Coelho

This is one of my favourite books, one I can read repeatedly. It is the story of a shepherd boy who dreams of travelling the world in search of treasure that anyone has ever found. It has been described as a novel about the essential wisdom of listening to our hearts and following our dreams. It looks like a short read, but it is well worth giving it a go. Beautifully written, and the descriptions of the Andalusian countryside are just lovely to read. Worth remembering sometimes. I highly recommend it.

The Couple at the Table by Sophie Hannah

This is a novel written by the same author, "Haven't they Grown' which was reviewed last month. I like the way Sophie writes. Although I understand that her writing is a bit like Marmite, you either love her or not. I most definitely do. This is a carefully written murder mystery. When you think you have the answer, another twist appears. The introduction to the book is "you receive a note warning you to beware of the couple at the table nearest to yours" What will happen? Read the book to find out. I couldn't put it down. I hope you enjoy it as well.

Most people, especially children are charmed and even inspired by the view of the Milky Way in a dark sky. It is something that takes you off this planet. This leads to an interest in science and more technical achievements in their education, a great thing for the country's future. Those views of the sky are limited in Norfolk now with sky glow being visible everywhere. It is also unnecessary and we can make savings by switching unneeded lights off or getting dimmer bulbs. Why do we now need to light everything so brightly and wastefully?

There is also the point about general irritation by light. Theymay think that it's inconsequential, or is helping keep the area safe (good intentions), but since when is it acceptable without asking? Even sensor lights-that-go-on-and-off,-can-be-triggered-by-cats,leaves, · dust, · anyone · walking · past · who · really · doesn't-need-that-thing-to-shine-at-them.-The-sensoris- clearly- too- sensitive- or- has- not- been- installedproperly-and-the-light-is-clearly-too-powerful. Puttingup-lights-incorrectly-isn't-always-considerate. Theonus· shouldn't· be· on· the· astronomers· or· neighbours-to-call-out-every-light-or-planned-light.-Inthe local area, Snetterton has increased in brightness, with big firms lighting the outside of the huge · buildings, · A · mass · production · chicken · farm · want- to- move- and- build- North- of- Snetterton, - theirexisting site is covered with lights shining out brightly in all directions. Look for the Milky Way, the huge galaxy in which our tiny solar system. exists, it is always there, especially in late summerand-autumn. So for now, be vigilant and watch and comment on planning proposals to try to counteract the spread of light pollution. Go chat to your neighbours- and-in-time, - politely- mention- the-lights.-We are all people just trying to do the best thing. Good- old- Sir- Patrick- Moore- used- to- say- (Iparaphrase), it is not that we ask anyone to turn the lights: out, just light the right thing, at the right brightness, at the right time. I would add to this to shield the light from going above the horizontal so no·glare·can·escape·the·property·(i.e.·no·one·can· see the bulb itself from outside the grounds of the property). This can be achieved by tilting the fixture fully- downwards, - achieving- a- much- less- harsh, glare-free look. Dim down-lights lighting the floor can help people see paths really nicely, these can be·solar·powered·but·are·often·not·glare-free·and· are-daylight-blue. The final reminder is to make sure the bulbs you install are a warm white colour and a temperature-of-3000K-or-less.-With-those-few-rulesapplied, everyone and nature can co-exist happily for many decades. ¶

GRANT AWARDING POLICY:

Who may apply for a grant?

You may apply for a grant from the Trust if:

You live within the Parish of Harling (East, Middle & West Harling).

You are in full or part time education including pre-school, school, college, apprenticeship, evening classes, university.

Please be aware that there is an upper age limit of 25.

Our criteria for a grant is that the requested need is "unable to be met out of ordinary income".

Types of grant:

If you qualify to apply for a grant, the Trust may give you a grant for any purpose that promotes your education in the broadest sense.

Examples of grants:

Financial assistance towards the costs of uniforms/clothing, tools, instruments, books, IT equipment etc to help you to take part in an educational course.

In exceptional circumstances allowances for living expenses to enable you to undertake a course or to enable you to travel in the UK or abroad to pursue your education.

Educational school trips / expeditions or with organised youth groups that will assist in your education. Attendance at activities such as Outward Bound or the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme.

Youth Groups/Schools etc may apply for group funding. Please adapt your answers to reflect the group rather than an individual.

SUCCESS STORY TEA AND TOTS

Tea and Tots reopened in September 2021 following being closed for Covid. After such difficult times we were keen to keep costs low for families and were originally running at a loss.

The trust contacted us regarding funding. We applied to the trust and were thrilled within weeks to receive a grant. Tea and Tots leaders Vickie and Julia put the allocated funds: to good use; buying a new rug and shelf for the book corner, sensory mirror blocks, small world pirate play, several math resources that encourage early numeracy and sorting skills, a 3 child rocking crocodile to promote co-operative play, and a water table, amongst many other things such as various craft resources.

Our numbers have steadily grown and we now regularly welcome 30 plus famillies from East Harling and surrounding towns and villagers.

We have had so many positive comments on the new resources, and it's fabulous to see the children enjoying and benefiting from good quality learning equipment that will continue to support the early education of local children for many years to come.


