

Our next walk is at Cavenham Heath Nature reserve, which is accessed from Tuddenham. This is a 2 1/2 mile walk taking in the nature, landscape and World War II relics. It's led by Martin Hull who has done this walk for U3A and BFER groups. It's on Sunday 29th June starting at 10.am.Cost is £2 members and £3 non members, cash on the day. Providing A Voice For Local Residents

As a Member of Parliament for a large rural constituency, farming and the environment is at the heart of much of my work. I regularly meet with local farmers and growers throughout South West Norfolk. It is their hard work after all, that results in food being available on our tables locally and for families all across the country.

On each visit I witness first-hand how passionate our local farmers and growers are about achieving food production through environmentally friendly practices, and we discuss how the Government can assist in supporting the industry. Following the recent pause of the Sustainable Farming Incentive (SFI), much of the conversation lately has centred on what the new scheme should look like.

Many have spoken to me about their frustrations with the scheme under the previous government, the countless forms, the unfairness of its 'first come, first served' approach, and brokers charging huge fees just to access it. The result was it was not fully utilised with millions of pounds of the last budget remaining unspent.We need the new SFI to be accessible and to work for the people it will benefit. That is why talking to the farmers who will utilise the scheme, to help shape the policy, is crucial.

Many members of my family are involved in farming and having grown up in Norfolk, I understand the challenges and the

concerns. That is why I am committed to ensuring South West Norfolk's farmers and growers have a key role in shaping this Government's farming policy, and indeed other policies. I am in regular contact with DEFRA, as well as Daniel Zeichner MP, Minister of State for Food Security and Rural Affairs.

During the pause in SFI applications, I want to hear from local farmers and growers about how it, and other support schemes can an improved, to collate ideas and feed back to Government.

To further assist in gathering views on SFI, the effectiveness and usefulness of other environmental schemes, and ideas for improving farm sustainability, I have created an online survey.

Another key issue of late has been the increase in solar farms proposals and of specific concern locally, the High Grove and Droves applications that could span parts of South West Norfolk – particularly in the East of the constituency around Ashill, Marham, Narborough, Sporle and Swaffham. I support efforts to improve energy security and support net zero ambitions, but we must undertake a pragmatic approach and recognise there are implications if these applications are approved.

Finding the right balance is imperative and we need to ensure that any proposal properly considers the effect on communities, the landscape and environment, as well as food production.

In response to these solar farm proposals, George Freeman MP and I have formed the *Breckland Solar Farm Alliance* to make sure our residents are heard. Whilst George and I might sit on opposite sides in the House of Commons, we are connected by our constituency lines, and that is why working together is fundamental to reach the best possible outcome for our local communities. I've always been prepared to put politics to one side and work cross-party on behalf of residents, and this solar farm alliance is a good example of that.

JUNE IN THE GARDEN

What a difference a year makes. Last June my article started with a reference to the fact that despite the weather between July 2023 and April 2024 being unbelievably wet and windy Mother Nature had done her thing. This year started similarly but with a few frosts, but from February onwards it has been cold sometimes, warm sometimes and hot occasionally, but dry dry dry. Anything that flowers has done so in abundance so hopefully a good crop of Fruit to come - certainly the plums, gooseberries and blackcurrants have set well and are looking promising. With 3 weeks of May left as I write this the 14 day forecast is for more sun and warmth, and no rain before very late May. In spite of the vagaries of the weather everything in the garden is doing what it should, more or less on time, or even early.

Tasks for June

Wildflower garden: While you are out and about enjoy the natural garden that nature provides in the forest and grass verges. Looking at the roadside verges up Lopham Road the nettles and brambles are doing well which tends to choke out the other wildflowers. If you have planted a wild section dig out anything you don't want to give the native species a chance.

Mow spring meadows towards the end of the month, or early in July. Leave the cut grass and stems for a few days for the seeds to drop, then rake up and compost.

Lawns: Mow if necessary with the blades set high. If you have room leave some space for nature (see above).

Roses: Remove any suckers as near to the base as possible. Cut out any dead wood. Remove dead flowers to encourage more blooms.

Perennials: Support taller growing perennials. Deadhead lupins and other perennials as soon as the flowers are over, with a bit of luck you may get a second set of flowers later in the summer.

Biennials: By the middle of the month is your last chance to sow pansies, forget-me-nots and primroses to plant out in the autumn for flowering next year. (Garden centres and nurseries will have plants ready to plant out in September).

Annuals: keep deadheading to promote more flowers

Greenhouse: Finish pricking out seedlings. Plant tomatoes, peppers, and cucumbers – best in the ground but large pots will do. Remember to keep watered and feed regularly with a high potassium liquid feed– the greenhouse can get very hot if we have sun. Keep well ventilated. Plant a few French marigolds or tagetes which deter aphids.

Pots, tubs and hanging baskets: Keep well watered, and feed flowers with a high potassium plant food (eg tomato food) weekly. Roots in a pot can't spread out looking for water and nutrient like they would in the ground.

Bulbs and corms: Divide and replant daffodils, narcissi, and bluebells if you didn't get round to it last month. Keep planting gladioli at fortnightly intervals to prolong the flowering season.

Cuttings: Young growth at this time of year makes good softwood cuttings. Use non-flowering shoots up to about 4 inches long (10 cms) from deciduous shrubs such as fuchsias, forsythia, mophead hydrangeas – don't forget to label!

Fruit: Protect cherries and redcurrants with netting unless you are growing for the birds. Pick gooseberries and blackcurrants when they are ripe. Continue pulling rhubarb stems and remove any flower stems.

Watch out for woolly aphids on fruit trees. These sap sucking insects hide under a waxy fluff on branches and shoots. Use a small stiff brush to remove them.

Vegetables: If you only have a small space there is no reason why you can't mix flowers and vegetables in the same area.

Sow outdoors: French and runner beans, beetroot, carrots, courgettes, marrows, lettuces, peas, radishes (a few at fortnightly intervals), spinach, and Florence fennel.

Plant out: sweetcorn, cauliflowers (not particularly good in the thin Brecks soil),courgettes, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbages leeks and tomatoes.

Harvest: First early potatoes, asparagus (until the middle of June, then leave to grow on to build up the plants for next year), late sprouting broccoli, broad beans, spring and summer cabbages, radishes, and anything else that is ready.

Compost grass clippings

Cut evergreen hedges such as privet. Don't do in full sun or cut leaves will scorch.

Slugs Not such a big problem this year. We had a few frosts and dry weather neither of which they like.

Five Friends to encourage in your garden:

- 1. Hedgehogs diet in the summer is mainly worms, caterpillars and beetles, but in the Autumn slugs become an important source of calories
- Many birds will devour slugs, especially robins, starlings, crows and rooks. Blackbirds prefer worms, but will eat slugs after wiping the excess slime off on the grass.
- Frogs, toads and slow worms are very partial to slugs. Slugs form about 25% of a frog's diet!
- 4. Carnivorous slugs. Many of the larger slugs are carnivorous or omnivorous feeding on worms, slugs and other bugs and grubs smaller than themselves.
- 5. Beetles and other invertebrates. Ground beetles are efficient predators roaming gardens to hunt their prey using their grasping jaws.

Remember to stop, look, and admire your handiwork from time to time. Good Gardening,

Scam QR codes continuing to catch motorists out.

Quick Response (QR) codes are those black and white patterned squares you scan with a smartphone, which then direct you to a website. They have become a popular tool for scammers, with reports to Action Fraud about all QR code scams, not just parking. These nasty scams can convince you to scan a dodgy QR code with your phone to pay for parking, only to sting you with a monthly subscription trap after gathering your personal and financial details.Nine councils across the UK have recently reported that QR codes have been left in council car parks on pay-and-display machines and parking boards. Bridgend County Borough Council warned that some QR codes led to fraudulent websites. These were found to be impersonating legitimate parking payment platforms RingGo and PayByPhone.

Previous Which? QR code scam investigations have found that these scams can be used to disguise phishing websites, misleading adverts, subscription traps or to infect your device with malware.

How to tell if a QR code is safe

Always follow these six checks before you scan a QR code:

Look for evidence of tampering – can you see that they've been stuck over something? If in doubt, enter the website address manually.

Avoid using an app to scan QR codes because it can increase the risk of downloading malware or being redirected to a misleading advert. Most phones have a scanner built into the camera, so use this instead.

Preview the address before following it. When you scan a QR code, the address should come up before you're redirected to it.

Use a verified app store (Play Store at play.google.com or App Store at apps.apple.com) to download apps instead of using a QR code as the latter is less trustworthy and could lead to malware being downloaded to your device.

Avoid QR codes in emails as these could be used by scammers to disguise phishing links.

Check the display board in car parks to see how you can pay for parking. If you lose any money to a scam, call your bank immediately using the number on the back of your bank card and report it to Action Fraud, or call the police on 101 if you're in Scotland.
